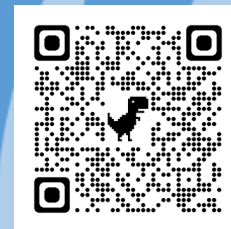

The Oregon Promise is a state grant that helps cover tuition costs at any Oregon community college for recent high school graduates and GED® test graduates. # SEPTEMBER

## FRESHMAN/SOPHOMORE

- Meet with your HS counselor to discuss career/college plans—create a your HS academic plan
- Explore career possibilities through CIS, Naviance, or CareerOneStop.org
- Get involved: Join a school activity, club, sports team
- Volunteer for something you find important
- Begin researching colleges, universities, career-technical schools and their majors or fields of training
- Learn high school courses that are required by colleges

## JUNIOR

- Review courses for this year and work with HS Counselor plan academic courses for your senior year
- Review high school transcript and school's requirements: Are you on track for graduation?
- Attend college admissions visitation events at your school
- Research colleges, universities, career-technical schools and their majors or fields of training
- Explore career possibilities in CIS, Naviance, or CareerOneStop.org
- Create a professional email address to use when applying for scholarships, admissions, registering for college entrance exams and completing college applications

## SENIOR

- Create a personal and professional email address to use on all college applications and scholarships
- Memorize your social security number
- Create a safe place to save your username/passwords (file, password safe app, etc.)
- SAT or ACT scores: Check your scores and see if you need to retake the tests (or take for the first time) and register
- Verify you are on track for graduation
- Prepare for the FAFSA: Get an FSA ID at [fsaid.ed.gov](https://fsaid.ed.gov) and download the FAFSA online worksheet at [fafsa.ed.gov](https://fafsa.ed.gov) to download the FAFSA worksheet online.
- Attend financial aid nights/workshops/events
- Attend college admissions visitation events at your school
- Research colleges, universities, career-technical schools and their fields
- Make your final list of 3-6 colleges you want to apply to, always include at least one Oregon community college
- Research min college admissions requirements for your top choice schools, review transcript to make sure you meet those requirements
- Identify and monitor college application deadlines (priority and regular deadlines)
- Complete essays for college admissions and scholarship; have your ASPIRE mentor proofread your work
- Begin submitting college applications
- Complete your Activities resume and/or "brag sheet"
- Fill out request forms for letters of recommendations to give to teachers, counselors, and/or employers. Include Activities resume/"brag sheet." Give the recommenders at least 2-4 weeks advance notice.
- Consider requesting PDF, signed copies of general letters of recommendation so you can reprint as needed
- Private colleges: Find out if they require an additional financial aid application (the CSS Profile) and if they accept the Common Application (list at [CommonApp.org](https://CommonApp.org))
- If you've been in foster care, see if you are eligible for Chafee Education & Training Grant
- Attend an OSAC Finding Funds presentation or online webinar
- Create account in OSAC Student Portal

# OCTOBER

## FRESHMAN/SOPHOMORE

- Sophomores: Take PSAT, if available
- Sign up for SAT Practice Question of the Day and ACT Question of the Day (email or mobile app)
- Learn how to make the most efficient use of your time
- Develop good habits—organization, attention to detail, begin using a calendar to meet deadlines
- Engage in your classes and school community
- Attend College and Career Fairs
- Begin researching colleges, universities, career-technical schools and their majors or fields of training

## JUNIOR

- Attend financial aid nights/workshops/events in preparation for your senior year—Learn the process
- Attend college and career fairs in your community
- Consider your social media footprint. Always be positive and professional when using social media. Colleges, scholarship committees, and employers often review an applicant's social media
- Sign up for SAT Practice Question of the Day and ACT Question of the Day (email or mobile app)
- Take the PSAT, if available
- Make list of careers you are interested in and research the education required for each profession
- Talk with professionals in careers you are curious about and ask about their work. You may request a formalized informational interview. Make sure you bring a list of questions

## SENIOR

- Complete the FAFSA (or the ORSAA, if DACA/undocumented) Call the federal help line [1-800-433-3243] or local college financial aid office if you have questions
- Review your Student Aid Report (SAR) and make any FAFSA corrections
- Private colleges: Find out if they require an additional financial aid application (the CSS Profile) and if they accept the Common Application (list at CommonApp.org)
- It's time to get organized: Create a Google Calendar and start placing known deadlines and events on your calendar.
- Attend College Goal Oregon financial aid nights/workshops/events
- Attend college fairs and career fairs in your community
- Attend college admissions fall preview days at the schools you are interested in—If you can't get to campus consider virtual college fairs and campus tours: [campustours.com](http://campustours.com), [youvisit.com](http://youvisit.com), [ecampustours.com](http://ecampustours.com) Use ASPIRE Campus Visit Questions resource
- Follow up with recommenders if you have not received your letter(s) of recommendation
- Finalize portfolios, audition materials or writing samples if required as part of the application
- Request unofficial and official transcripts from your high school registrar—you will need both types depending on the application. College Admissions typically wants Official transcripts, scholarships applications may only require unofficial. Have several on hand to use through fall semester as needed
- Research college application deadlines (priority and regular deadlines) - some colleges require a priority deadline to apply for their college general scholarships—don't miss out!
- Begin work on essays for college admissions and scholarship; have your ASPIRE mentor proofread your work
- Complete and submit college admissions applications
- Continue to add to your activities chart any new activities, projects, honors, or achievements - Track all hours spent working for pay, volunteering, and working in community activities
- Ask your counselor or ASPIRE coordinator for a list of local scholarships so you can begin to identify and work on scholarship essays apps
- If you've been in foster care, see if you are eligible for Chafee Education & Training Grant
- Attend an OSAC Finding Funds presentation or

# NOVEMBER

## FRESHMAN/SOPHOMORE

- Identify your interests and skills to help you focus on your goals — Take CareerOneStop.org Self-Assessments
- Explore career possibilities through CIS, Naviance, or College Navigator
- Consider taking career technical education courses offered at your HS to explore career pathways
- Begin researching colleges, universities, career-technical schools and their majors or fields of training
- Attend college fairs and career fairs

## JUNIOR

- Consider how you can enhance skills that will be useful in a career of interest through your extracurricular, service, or HS classes you choose
- Meet with college admissions recruiters when they visit your HS—Ask questions, make an impression
- Begin to identify and narrow your college list
- Research college websites for admission requirements
- Become or stay involved in extracurricular activities
- Start your SAT or ACT preparation—practice tests and support can be found at [sat.org](http://sat.org) & [act.org](http://act.org)
- Create a safe place to save your username/passwords (file, password safe app, etc.)
- Learn about the different types of Financial Aid: [studentaid.gov/understand-aid/types](http://studentaid.gov/understand-aid/types)
- Create an account in the OSAC Student Portal

## SENIOR

- Complete the FAFSA (or the ORSAA, if DACA/undocumented)
- Review your Student Aid Report (SAR) and make any FAFSA corrections
- Look for opportunities to financial aid and scholarship workshops/events
- Attend college fairs and career fairs in your region or local community
- Attend college preview day events at your top college choices—get a feel for the campus, use the ASPIRE Campus Visit Questions resource
- Still unsure of where to apply? Research colleges, universities, career-technical schools and their fields of study
- Narrow down your list of colleges—if you have added a school to your list make sure you also add that school to your FAFSA/ORSAA
- Always note deadlines and events on your calendar, adding reminder notifications help
- Continue your work on college admissions and scholarship applications
- Make sure you look for additional scholarship applications at the schools you apply to. Many have additional applications, beyond the admissions application—Note deadlines and don't miss out!
- Make sure you always read, proofread, and have another person review your essays/applications before submitting
- Continue to submit completed college applications
- Fill out request forms for letters of recommendations to give to teachers, counselors, and/or employers. Give the letter writers at least 4 weeks advance notice.
- Private colleges: Find out if they require an additional financial aid application (the CSS Profile) and if they accept the Common Application (list at [CommonApp.org](http://CommonApp.org))
- Oregon community colleges: All seniors should complete the Oregon Promise Grant application
- If you've been in foster care, see if you are eligible for Chafee Education & Training Grant
- Attend an OSAC Finding Funds presentation or watch the video online
- OSAC Scholarship Application opens Nov 1
- Create account in OSAC Student Portal
- OSAC Personal Statements and Activity Chart
- Continue to stay involved in extracurriculars
- Explore local, regional, and university scholarship opportunities

## FRESHMAN/SOPHOMORE

- Maintain your grades and school attendance
- Learn to ask questions in your classes, with your counselor/ASPIRE mentor. The most successful people ask questions
- Job Shadow: Spend a day with a family member, friend, or community member and learn about their job
- Talk to current college students about their path to college
- Consider taking virtual tours of college campuses at [www.youvisit.com](http://www.youvisit.com) or [www.ecampustours.com](http://www.ecampustours.com)
- Begin to talk with your parents/guardians about future plans

## JUNIOR

- Begin to consider who you will ask for recommendation letters (teachers, coaches, counselors, employers, etc.)
- Continue to use SAT Practice Question of the Day and ACT Question of the Day (email or mobile app)
- Stay active and involved and look for leadership opportunities
- Maintain your grades—colleges use transcripts from the end of junior year for admission decisions
- Continue to attend college visitation events at your school—ask questions to help you narrow your college choices
- Explore career possibilities in CIS, Naviance, or CollegeOneStop.org
- Match career interests to college majors and determine what schools have your program of interest
- Talk to current college students you know home on holiday break about their path to college

## SENIOR

- Keep your social media clean, positive, and focused on family, positive relationships/activities and your personal accomplishments.
- Complete the FAFSA (or the ORSAA, if DACA/undocumented)
- Need assistance with your FAFSA/ORSAA? Attend an OSAC Webinar, or attend local College Goal Oregon or regional financial aid assistance events/workshops
- Use your holiday break wisely. Keep searching for scholarships—take time and care on your essays—this is how the scholarship committees get to know you
- Attend college admission visits at your school
- Order more official or unofficial transcripts as needed—use for college and scholarship apps
- Reevaluate your upcoming deadlines for admissions and scholarship applications over the holiday break
- Continue to submit your college applications
- Consider if you need additional or specific letters of recommendations for upcoming apps.
- Update your resume and activities chart
- Private colleges: Find out if they require an additional financial aid application (the CSS Profile) and if they accept the Common Application (list at [CommonApp.org](http://CommonApp.org))
- If you've been in foster care, see if you are eligible for Chafee Education & Training Grant
- If you haven't create account in OSAC Student Portal: [OregonStudentAid.gov](http://OregonStudentAid.gov)
- Complete the Oregon Promise Grant application
- Start OSAC Personal Statements and Activity Chart
- Explore local, regional, and university scholarship opportunities
- Talk to current college students you know home on holiday break about their experiences in college
- Discuss your future goals and college plans with your parents. Begin the conversation of how you will pay for post HS education. Share the fields of study, colleges, universities, trades schools or military service you are considering.

# JANUARY

## FRESHMAN/SOPHOMORE

- Sign up for SAT Practice Question of the Day and ACT Question of the Day (email or mobile app)
- Continue exploring career possibilities through CIS, Naviance, or CareerOneStop.org
- As you identify interests, explore different post-high school educational options (career-technical school, 2-year, 4-year, etc.). Determine what type of education is needed for careers you are interested in
- Research college/training school admission requirements to get an idea of what classes you need to take
- Talk with your HS counselor about taking AP, IB, or Dual Credit college courses to receive college credit
- Track your activities using the ASPIRE/OSAC Activities Chart: Keep track of all activities, clubs, community service, paid employment, awards, and leadership roles—note participation dates and involvement, etc.

## JUNIOR

- Start gathering information on cost of attendance (COE) and financial aid options at schools of interest
- Continue practicing for the SAT and/or ACT
- Register to take ACT and/or SAT - take first tests during spring or summer so you have the opportunity to take it again in the fall senior year if you want. Though many schools are now test-optional it is still recommended.
- Narrow down your top educational options—Research colleges, universities, career-technical schools and their majors or fields of training
- If planning on attending a 4-year school, put together a list of 10 colleges of interest. Plan on applying to 3-6 schools during senior year, always include an Oregon community college.
- Research colleges' admissions requirements and note any additional courses or requirements you need to qualify
- Sign up for the College Board Big Future Scholarship where you could earn a scholarship for simply completing steps to plan for college: BigFuture.CollegeBoard.org
- Get more information on federal financial aid at: StudentAid.ed.gov
- Attend local financial aid nights/workshops/events or online webinars at OregonStudentAid.gov/Webinars, with a parent or guardian if possible
- Track your activities using the ASPIRE/OSAC Activities Chart: Keep track of all activities, clubs, community service, paid employment, awards, and leadership roles—note participation dates and involvement, etc.
- Open a bank or credit union account and save money for the future (college and living expenses)

## SENIOR

- Submit applications to at least three colleges
- Check with colleges you have applied to make sure they have received all necessary documents. Continue to monitor applications
- Check your personal email regularly and respond to requests in a timely manner
- Attend scholarship workshops at your HS or attend online OSAC Scholarship webinar
- Complete the Oregon Promise Grant application
- If you haven't, complete the FAFSA (or the ORSAA, if DACA/undocumented)
- Apply for local, regional, and college scholarships
- Investigate private national scholarships and other student aid programs: CollegeBoard.org, JLV Counseling.com/ Scholarships, Fastweb.com and many more...
- Place all scholarship application deadlines on your calendar with reminder notifications
- Check your email and OSAC Student Portal for notifications
- If you've been in foster care, see if you are eligible for Chafee Education & Training Grant

- Identify which applications require recommendation letters

## SENIOR

- Spend time with your family and friends - if you will be leaving for home set expectations for while you are in college on how and when you will communicate during the school year
- Register for your fall college classes
- Attend your college orientation
- Connect with other students attending your college of choice through college apps, or when you meet at orientation
